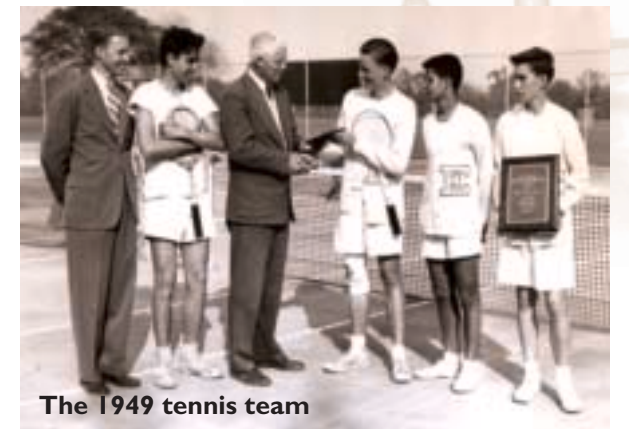
congratulating the winning players. But those of us who pore over pictures from the past recognized this as a photo of the 1949 team that ran in the supplement to that year's *PEAN*.

## Corrections

• In a group photo of the faculty members of who traveled to China last summer that appears on page 6 of the centennial issue, we identified the fellow in the jaunty straw hat as Phil Loughlin '57, a former Academy trustee. In fact, he is Professor Richard Smith of Rice University, one of the many Asia experts who met with Exeter faculty during their study tour, which was sponsored by the East-West Center, an education and research organization in Honolulu. A former Academy trustee, Loughlin is a member of the East West Center's Foundation board, and he was instrumental in arranging the trip and also helped to lead it.

• Poor math led us to subtract a year from the tenure of Richard Day, the Academy's 10th principal, in a photo caption on page 25. Day served as principal from 1964 to 1974.

• Finally, in "A Piece of Cake," a short sidebar on page 15 about a 1951 *Saturday Evening Post* cover by artist Stevan Dohanos that showed a group of Hoyt Hall residents opening a cake sent from home, we assigned Steve Bolster '51 to the wrong dorm. Reverend Edward Gleason '51; '69, '70, '71 (Hon.) wrote us to say that "Steve was my roommate in Peabody Hall. He did not live in Hoyt with the others, but arranged to be in the painting." Gleason adds that Dohanos, a well-known illustrator, painted another *Post* cover during his two-week residency, this one of "of Charles W.F. Smith, rector, shaking hands of parishioners at Christ Church, then located on Elliott Street where the dean's house is now located."
