HARKNESS FELLOWS SHARE A WEALTH OF IDEAS

During the spring term, Exeter welcomed a third and final group of Harkness Fellows to campus, as part of its celebration of the Harkness 75th anniversary: the current U.S. Poet Laureate, **Donald Hall '47**, who gave up a public reading from his work; **Sarah Lyall '81**, a reporter with the London bureau of *The New York Times*, who delivered the second annual Paul Klebnikov '81 Memorial Lecture; **Priya Wadhera '90**, director of the Maison Française at Columbia University, the oldest French cultural center established on an American university campus; legal scholar and author **Lincoln Caplan '68**, who is now a managing partner with SeaChange Capital Partners, a nonprofit finance firm that matches outstanding nonprofit organizations involved in youth education and development with innovative philanthropists; art dealer **Shalini Amerasinghe Ganendra '82**, director of The Private Gallery in Malaysia; and **Francesca Grifo '77**, a senior scientist and director of the Scientific Integrity Program with the Union of Concerned Scientists in Washington, D.C.

Also participating in the Harkness Fellow program were the four alumni/ae participants in the annual Robbins Memorial Symposium, which this year explored “Social Entrepreneurialship: New Pathways Out of Poverty”: **M. Kamal Ahmad '83**, president and CEO of Asian University for Women Support Foundation, created to establish the first all-women’s residential international university in Asia; **Thomas Haslett '79**, a senior advisor with the Foundation Strategy Group, a nonprofit organization dedicated to accelerating social progress by advancing the practice of philanthropy and corporate social responsibility through advice, ideas and action; **Jennifer Sarja '91**, executive director of YouthInkwell Publishing, which gives students the opportunity to create and publish their own books to raise money for social causes relating to youth and education; and **Dennis Whittle '79**, chairman and CEO of GlobalGiving, founded in 2000 by two former World Bank executives who use the Internet to directly connect donors to projects throughout the globe via their “public” website and traditional giving services.
